1st Place. Nathaniel Y7. Taken going up Langdale Pikes. "The contours just keep getting closer!!!"





3rd place. Amelia Y7. My photo shows physical, human and environmental geography. Physical- natural features of the River Mersey with the sun shining above. Human- manmade bridge and road, the symbol for river on a map is a blue line. Environmental- trees either side and water running through providing a home for animals.



1 Place. Dexter Y8. I have chosen my subject piece to be the San Francisco 49ers Levi's Stadium in Santa Clara, California as this relates to sport in geography. It is 40 miles south of San Francisco and was chosen for its existing infrastructure. The Stadium is an open stadium design with a capacity of 68,500. There is a rooftop farm producing crops used in the stadiums catering. The 49ers are owned by the York Family who also own Leeds United. They are named the 49ers after the 1849 Gold Rush in San Francisco.



 2^{nd} Place. Max Y8. I took this photo of Latchford bridge in the evening . I like the way the bridge is reflected in the water and this is the bridge I cross to get to school .

Canals are man-made and exists where water does not flow naturally . Rivers however exist where water naturally gathers . Canals are man-made waterways designed to serve a purpose in controlling the flow of the water , they rely on integrated features like locks and dams . They also help letting out excess water after heavy rain fall . Canals can be thought of as artificial rivers .



3rd Place. Magnus Y8. <u>Popular Sport</u> This photo was taken in Old Trafford Stadium. One day, I was riding my bike to the Old Trafford Stadium. Football and cycling are both popular sports.



1 Place. Santiago Y9. This small house is in Ambleside (which is in the lake District). It is a 17th century house which used to be an apple store but it was originally built on a bridge, so the owners didn't pay land tax. It is now part of the national trust.

One of the ways tourism has grown is by transport being more available to people and the development of air travel. Air travel is good for tourism but also impacts the environment.



3 Place. Jack Y9. This photo was taken in Bormio, a ski resort in Italy. The photo links with Geographic subjects I studied the past couple of years. For example, the past couple of years, I have studied maps in Geography. We studied how to work out the steepness and top and bottom of mountain ranges. this included studying contour lines and learning the closer they got, the steeper the mountain got. That is why this picture links with that subject because the mountains in the picture are the Alps, and the mountain from which I took the picture from is 3000metres above sea level. It isn't a glacier, but when the snow melts, it flows down streams which link all the way to lakes just outside of Milan.

1st Place. Caitlin Y11. Giants Causeway - an area of about 40,000 interlocking basalt columns - the result of an ancient volcanic fissure eruption over 6 million years ago. Off the North coast of Northern Ireland in County Antrim, Giants Causeway is one of the 7 wonders. It was formed by erosion processes such as hydraulic action, abrasion and attrition. These processes formed the polygon shaped stones and vertical columns that make the Causeway. This picture shows the wonders of coasts and the omnipotence of the environment to form such spectacular scenes.



2nd Place. Jacob Y10. My photograph links to the topic of coastal landscapes as it was taken in Kao Sok national park in Thailand, on the Indian Ocean.



3rd Place. Lucy Y11. This photo was taken in my front garden, and I have identified it as a fly agaric mushroom. This links to my topic of world biomes and the organisms living within them.

PARENTS' EVENING LETTER

As you will know, we moved to Schoolcloud 'virtual' parents' evenings during the Coronavirus. Due to overwhelmingly positive feedback, we have retained the format. We continue to review this decision and are keen to overcome any barriers faced by parents when using this particular platform. We recently trialed a 'live' British Sign Language Interpreter, who interpreted for a deaf parent. Both parent and interpreter were present in our meetings room, whilst teaching colleagues streamed remotely. Another parent who is deaf, kindly observed the process and writes as follows about the experience:

On the 30th of November I was grateful to have the opportunity to sit in as an observer in a new Year 7s first parents' evening, along with her parents, to experience the parent portal on a large screen in the school with an in-person sign language interpreter.

I am a parent of a current Y9 student at Bridgewater. I have had many years experience of being a parent and supporting my children through high school, both in Cumbria and in last 8 years at Bridgewater.

I am also profoundly deaf.

Having access to all things within high school life which most parents would take for granted, such as information evening of all kinds, presentations/performances and parents evening has always been hit and miss, whilst I can lipread, lipreading is unreliable only 30 percent is visible, the rest is guess work. It is also very tiring, so my preference is using a British sign language interpreter to participate, follow and fully understand communication with others.

When covid happened, with the many challenges and difficulties it presented us all with, I also lost access to the world with communication. Everyone wore face masks and everything, including school and Parents' Evenings, moved online.

I cannot lipread a flat screen at all, most virtual platforms do not provide reliable subtitles or support adding an extra "person" which stays on the screen at all times. Nor can reliable internet connection be guaranteed which further impacts screen quality and lag. All these are essential when watching a visual language on a screen, as if the screen is blurred or freezes, your communication is lost.

Unfortunately the school platforms that are used have all these issues, so I missed out on all parents' evenings etc because of covid.

I had hoped that in person events including parents evening would return – as there is no lag or internet connection issues in face-to-face contact, and you can make use of a "in person" sign language interpreter, but this isn't meant to be at this time. I informed the school of the difficulty I faced accessing these things and a few things were tried over last year but, again a sign language interpreter couldn't be added virtually for me to see,

So Thursday the 30th November was a new trial, for which I was invited along to, and along with the other parent we made the most of a in person sign language interpreter and together worked out what worked well and what worked less well, and so going on this system can be used until such a time face to face parents evenings might return.

If you have a communication need, or any need that poses a barrier in accessing parents evening, do contact the school, don't feel you must miss out. There may be trial and error along the way, but they will try and work with you to find a solution.


On the 19th of December, Bridgewater received a visit from the Future First Alumni organisation.



BTEC DANCE

During the week commencing the 4th December, year 11 dance were excited to give their final performance for Component 2 Btec Dance. This allowed the girls to bank 30% of their overall grade, resulting in the completion of 60% of the course (having completed their component 1 performance earlier in the year).

Component 2 consisted of the understanding and learning of a professional piece whilst improving physical and interpretive skills. The choreography that was selected was inspired by the theme that was provided by the exam board: 'Power'. Each dancer utilised the theme to think about someone whom they are missing themselves, enabling each dancer to incorporate their deep and meaningful emotions into the piece. This allowed each performance to be unique to the dancers.

The skills that the girls aimed to improve consisted of flexibility, movement memory, strength, musicality and characterisation. All of the girls have noticed a great improvement within all aspects of these skills from the beginning of the rehearsal process to the final performance. This experience has fuelled the girls' ambition to succeed in completing their final component and therefore the entirety of Btec Dance.

Btec Dance also included written work. For Component 2, this was a final evaluation and a booklet that was completed throughout the rehearsal process. Although the written work was not as enjoyable as the dancing, the girls still enjoyed the journey that lead them to the fantastic marks that they received.

To conclude, the journey that the dancers took to reach their end goal was one that will influence their future, even if their chosen career does not involve dance.




Damario represented England at a European Youth Roller Hockey Tournament in September.



YEAR 7 NEWS





Rugby League in Term 1

The Year 7 Rugby team have had a good start to their season and having competed in the Warrington Schools Competition (Organised by Warrington Wolves) in September, they finished 2nd and qualified for the Northwest Regional Competition.

In the first game of the Northwest Counties, we drew 12-12 with Bedford in a fantastic contest which saw over 20 players represent the school.

We then travelled to Standish where we played very well but were narrowly beaten by 16-12 however, we showed signs of real improvement from Game 1.

In our final group game, we travelled to Wade Deacon and picked up our first win of the season winning by 14 points to 10. There were some excellent individual performances but most importantly an excellent team spirit and the team fully deserved their win.

The Year 8 Rugby team have had an excellent start to their season. Having won the Warrington Schools tournament, they have been placed in a Northwest Schools group with St. Peters, Saddleworth, and St Cuthberts.

The boys faced Saddleworth at home first. After a close first half we raced away for a 26-4 win. The second game was away at St. Peters, a school well known for its rugby league. In tricky conditions we were victorious winning 26-12. The boys will now progress to the national stage of the competition.

The Year 9 Rugby team have had a mixed start to the season. In the North west counties tournament they have performed excellently, demonstrating why they've made the national final two years in a row. This has led to them qualifying for the national stage of the competition yet again.

The year 10 rugby team have had a strong start to their season. In the Warrington Schools competition, they finished first resulting in them drawing Deanery, St Ambrose, and Cowley in the Northwest competition. Having beaten St Ambrose, they still have Cowley and Deanery left to play.
